

### Sixth Form Induction Day Film Studies Taster Session



### **FILM STUDIES A LEVEL (EDUQAS)**

- Students will need a deep interest in film and will utilise many of the same analytical skills required by English Literature. It's rather like the poetry work that you've studied. You learn new terminology, analyse texts, make notes and then write essays. There's even the opportunity to research the context of old classics and develop your own interpretations!
- Film Studies is a discipline that deals with textual, theoretical, historical and critical approaches to films. Film Studies also explores our role as the spectator and the psychology behind audience response. We study an exciting range of films from diverse national and cultural backgrounds.



#### How will I be assessed?

• There are two exams worth 35% each. Here you are asked to complete three or four essay style responses on individual films or pairs of films that you have studied.

There is also a non-examination assessment where you can take the
opportunity to produce your own short film or screenplay and
storyboard to a brief set by the exam board. This more creative
assessment task is worth 30% of the course.



### What texts will I study?

The texts offered by the exam board can vary from year to year and may include films with an 18 certificate. <u>Your texts are likely to be:</u>
