Starter activities

- Interpreting script to communicate character
- + planning the stage.

- What's it about?!

- Read through the short scene and try to come up with a scenario and context for it.
- How is the scene linked to the play's title 'Love and Information'?



Discussion/ Analysis

- Consider what the message might be behind this particular scene, with this quote from a review of the play in mind:
- "Churchill's characters cling to the elusive and illusive notion that, with enough information, they could understand each other and control their hearts and their environment. The playwright catches them out."

- Performance choices and skills to communicate character.
- Analysing and Evaluating the work.



Ground plans


• 2. On a piece of paper, do a quick drawing of a room in your house that you are familiar with.

Now, take a look at a typical Theatre Ground plan


- This is a plan of the stage, [drawn from a bird's eye view]

The Three Components

Component 1: Theatre Workshop

- You participate in the creation, development and performance of a piece of theatre based on a reinterpretation of an extract from a text chosen from a list.
- The piece must be developed using the techniques and working methods of either an influential theatre practitioner or a recognised theatre company.
- Then produce: a creative log.

Component 2: Text in Action

- Creation, development and performance of two pieces of theatre from a **stimulus**.
- Visiting Examiner (March- May) + Written Evaluation

Component 3: Text in Performance

The written exam. Section A and B, open book. Two questions based on two different texts, one pre 1956, one post 1956.



Section C Closed book. A question based on a specific extract from THE CURIOUS INCIDENT OF THE DOG IN THE NIGHTTIME. (Extract given in March, year 2)

Top tips for studying Drama and Theatre at A Level.

- Buy the texts and read them.
- Read other plays before, and during the course.
- Go and watch as much Live theatre as possible.
- Watch more shows on the dramaonlinelibrary.com webpage.
 There are lots of National Theatre shows available to watch for free.
- Find reviews of shows in newspapers/ online, such as The Guardian or The British Theatre Guide.
